Logistics are just a part of the port's growing business activities, which include major employers from aerospace, cybersecurity and applied technology as well as the U.S. Department of Defense.






Port San Antonio is one of Texas' two intermodal facilities, making it different from traditional ports. Here's how it works:



JOB SECTORS
