ABOUT HIDALGO

Hidalgo's three border crossings facilitate commercial, vehicular and pedestrian traffic between the U.S. and Mexico. It's a key port of entry for Mexican factories called maquiladoras, which receive duty- and tariff-free raw materials from the U.S. and return finished goods. A 2011 Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas study found that a 10 percent increase in maquiladora output equates to a 6.6 percent increase in nearby McAllen's transportation employment.



The 2015 completion of a superhighway connecting western Mexico's produce growers with the Hidalgo port of entry was instrumental in increasing produce imports across the Pharr Bridge. To accommodate this increase, the city of Pharr built the
